What are the Library/Archives' Reference Room Hours?

Fridays 9:00am-4:00pm and during the week by appointment

Where is the Library/Archives Reference Room?

On the first floor of the History Nebraska building, 1500 R Street (south edge of UNL's city campus)

What to expect when you visit the Library/Archives Reference Room

Sign in and use agreement form (just to promise to take good care of the primary sources you'll be handling)

Lockers for possessions

Only phone, pencils and notepads in the workspace with the primary sources You'll be asked to wear gloves if looking at primary sources

Staff will provide additional how-to's for handling materials

What you can do before you visit

Call the Reference Room staff at 402-471-4751 or by email hn.reference@nebraska.gov to request specific materials be retrieved and brought to the Reference Room before you visit and those items will be ready for you to look at. The staff can also retrieve materials during the time of your visit, but how quickly that happens depends on how busy the staff is.



What if I find a photo I like?


To see it in the Reference Room

In Person - Some photos are in folders and can be handled, when wearing gloves, other photo collections are on microfilm, which the staff will show you how to use

Can I get a copy?

In Person - the staff can make a photocopy for you for 25 cents/copy Online - you can place an order using this link

What if I find something in a manuscript collection I like?

To see it in the Reference Room

In Person - Some photos are in folders and can be handled, when wearing gloves, other photo collections are on microfilm, which the staff will show you how to use

In Person - the staff can make a photocopy for you for 25 cents/copy OR you can take a photo with your cell phone

What if I find a book I want to look at?

To see it in the Reference Room

In Person - you can fill out a short form to request that the book be brought to the Reference Room

Can I make copies?




Manuscript Short-Cut

Manuscripts = business ledgers, legal records, minutes of meetings, letters, reports, diaries, scrapbooks, original literary works, estate papers, publications, and genealogical research






Any of these categories bulleted and listed above in blue (Business Records, Church Records, etc.) are links to alpha-ordered collection listings such as this one for Political Records.






Then each entry in blue, is a link to a collection, such as this one. It was in the list as Boosalis, Helen G.








Newspaper Short-Cut - National







The Chronicling America finding aid can be filtered by state and year - very powerful!! It brings up the exact newspaper section and the matching terms within the newspaper article are highlighted for easy use.














Photos & Artifacts Short-cut








Click on "Keyword Search" or "Advanced Search" to get started.




This "Keyword Search" using the term "Red Cloud" yielded over 200 finding the town of Red Cloud, the former Indian Agency of Red Cloud and the Chief Red Cloud.






In this "Advanced Search" I entered "Red Cloud" in the People field. And it yielded 88 entries with more direct association to the person, Chief Red Cloud.


